For those observant last month – the outline of the Foundation committee is included this month on page 2, as well as one of the youth committees not detailed last month either!



The New Generations Exchange is a program aimed at developing skills in young adults (18-30), through an international exchange around their vocation. They are responsible for airfares, and the host club arranges accommodation and ensures they are placed at a suitable company to

develop their skills. A number of inbound exchanges are in the planning stages at the moment



ROTARY FAMILY HEALTH DAYS (RFHD) are scheduled for the 2 - 4 OCTOBER 2019

Some Clubs have extended these dates around the set 3 days, or are doing more than one site whilst other clubs have joined forces for better impact.

I am encouraged by the groundswell of interest and enthusiasm evident in so many of the Clubs in our District that are ready to 'Connect their clubs to the world in their own communities' by means of the RFHD in their areas.

We received the official 'go ahead' from Government via a "Letter of Authority" which cleared communication with the Departments of Health and City Health, with the full confidence of their support, and are now getting into the nuts and bolts of the event planning.

My wish is, that not only are we focusing on the RFHD and the various services that we will be providing, but also using the RFHD programme to advertise Rotary – following on this year's theme of "Connecting the World". We have a bonanza amount of 37 Sites in our district which is the most we have ever had!!

I was pleased to be able to distribute the **marketing and artwork** for printing and advertising so that each Club can print their own fliers and posters with individualised information. This is a new approach we hope will work well.

I wish all the clubs and Rotarians all the best for a successful RFHD – I know you are all going to make us proud and we look forward to hearing and seeing all the pictures and videos on our the RFHD and District Face book pages.

Interact Newsletter from Peter Sharples - District Interact Chair -

At an Interact Training Session, the Goodwood Rotarian, Wally, told me what seemed to be a tall story involving Goodwood Rotary Club and Poland. It was so interesting that I followed this story through and these are the facts.......

Between 1 & 6 September 1939 the Germans and Soviets attacked and defeated Poland. This was the start of WW2. All Rotary Clubs in Poland closed.

In August 1944 the South African Air Force (SAAF) was heavily involved in the dropping of supplies to support the Warsaw Uprising against Nazi Germany.

Thirty nine (39) South African airmen died in action, and were buried in Warsaw.

In 1962, Goodwood Rotarian Igo Nitoslawski (known as "Nito") visited Poland and was given the only Warsaw Rotary Club Banner to take back to South Africa for safe-keeping, due to the positive impression that the SAAF had made. Three copies were made: one was sent to RI Headquarters in Chicago, one to the SAAF Museum, and the third copy was returned by PDG Michael Johnson to Warsaw in 1989 when the Warsaw Rotary Club reopened, after the fall of Communism.

In September 1997, Newlands Rotarian Roy Zazeraj visited Poland to see his brother Vic, who was South Africa's Polish Ambassador, and they visited the Warsaw Rotary Club and were asked to find the original banner...

An appeal was made in *Rotary Africa* if anyone knew where the original banner was.

In December 1997, ex-Goodwood Rotarian, Ralph Johansson (now living in Australia), was in Hermanus on holiday, enjoying a braai with PP Oom Johnny Van Niekerk and PP Andre Minne when the conversation came round to the missing banner. Ralph choked on his beer and said he had the banner in his safe at his flat in Sea Point...

It was with much excitement that these three Goodwood Rotarians (Ralph, Oom Johnnie, and Andre) returned the banner to the Warsaw Club on Tuesday 10th November 1998. Andre said grown men were weeping they were so emotional at getting their original banner back. Oom Johnny said every dignitary you could imagine was there.

This was shown on two Polish TV programmes, and on the Carte Blanche TV programme



The Rotary Club Cape of Good Hope

Thanks to the initiative of the Neighbourhood Gardens and Braai Master, Justin Bonello, who is also a local resident, the Rotary Club assisted by volunteers from the community and business sector, helped to plant an innovative 'Rain Garden' in the grounds adjacent to the Fish Hoek Municipal offices. Plants and mulch were donated by Justin Bonello and members of the Fish Hoek community. The garden gets its water from the rain water run-off in the street, where a channel is made for the rain water to detour into the furrows around which the plants in the center are planted.

A pathway of mulch was laid to add to the ambiance of the garden. More work is needed but an excellent start was made

In August we took the next step in supporting the MOU (Memorandum of Understanding) which D9350 signed with Western Cape Department of Basic Education (WCDBE).

Our Rotary District has appointed six Regional Educational Facilitators thus far and done their first round of training, who will work in partnership with the WCDBE District Managers and the Rotary Assistant Governor and Rotary Clubs in each of the Educational Districts below:-

Metro North - Isolet Jansen (Melkbos RC); Metro Central -Janet Kriseman (Waterfront RC)

Metro SouthGeraldine Nicol (Newlands RC); Eden & Central Karoo District (Di Kershaw George RC) Cape Winelands — Lorna
Reade (Worcester RC); Overberg District — Noelene Cole (Swellendam RC)

The role of the Rotary District Facilitators is initially to develop and / or strengthen existing relationships between Educational District Managers and Rotary / Rotaract clubs in the relevant districts in respect of new projects which clubs wish to initiate which involve a partnership with a government institution / school - or approaches from government institutions (schools) to partner with a local Rotary club for a local community need – education or otherwise.

In addition the Regional Facilitators will act as the go between in terms of clubs new and existing projects to avoid duplication of effort, and share information and experience which clubs have gained through their current and previous projects.

The role specifically excludes being directly involved in existing projects between clubs and institutions, unless specifically requested by the clubs involved. The Regional Facilitators will in the next few months be contacting the Rotary clubs in their areas to find out about the wide range of educational projects clubs are involved in - from ECD through to computers, science and language and library support and any other aspect of education where there is a need.

We hope this will improve the liaison with the Department of Education as we all need to work together to tackle the educational challenges facing the country, not least of which is a 78% illiteracy and innumeracy rate in our Grade 4 children, national wide!!
