What was really a reality check, was visiting a home that supports Polio victims in Cutambela (just below Lobito). My meeting these young people, and putting faces and a voices to Polio hit home hard. The Polio victims are like any young

person – with dreams and wishes for the future, but now facing additional hurdles to achieve these.



CEO & General Secretary of Rotary International - John Hewko visited Cape Town

Whilst attending the **World Economic Forum** in Cape Town, **John Hewko** took time out to visit the Cape Rotary Mother Club of Cape Town where he was their guest speaker on Tuesday 3_{rd} September.

John spoke on his role at Rotary International Headquarters in Evanston, Illinois, where he leads up a staff compliment of more than 800 people.

He discussed the many challenges Rotary has in terms of Membership growth and the Strategic Plan for Rotary's future, both of which ensure that we continue to be known as a respected and dynamic Organisation worldwide. He also gave an update about Polio eradication with the very positive news that Africa will soon be announced as a Polio free continent.

With September being Basic Education and Literacy Month, which is one of RI's Areas of Focus, John Hewko explained that both are essential for reducing poverty, improving health, encouraging community and promoting peace, and he suggested we consider these facts:

- If all woman completed Primary education, there would be 66% fewer maternal deaths
- Even after four years of primary schooling, as many as 250 million children cannot read and write and 781 million adults are illiterate
- A child born to a mother who can read is 50% more likely to survive past the age of five
- If all students in low-income countries left school with basic reading skills, 171 million people could be lifted out of poverty, which would be equivalent to a 12% cut in world poverty.

The world is making good progress in this area. According to a recent UN report, literacy rates among adults and youths are on the rise and the gender gap in literacy is narrowing, but global needs remain whilst there are still 58 million children worldwide without schooling.

Being an enterprising man, after his studies at Oxford University in the UK, John and his fellow students bought a truck to drive through Africa, after which he then needed a 'lift' to South America and so managed to secure a crew position on a yacht 2 hours before they sailed from the Royal Cape Yacht Club to Uruguay!!
